the job I pride myself on my ability to predict animal behaviour. How-
ever on this occasion I got it horribly wrong, the dog turned around and
bit my face.

The good news was that some stitches to my nose and lip had me
roughly back in one piece, although I did look like an extra from the
Hobbit for a few days.

So I was feeling a little sorry for myself and decided to cheer myself up
with a mountain bike ride with friends in Rotorua. You know already that
this is unlikely to have a happy ending. To cut a long story short I fell off
and ended up in Middlemore hospital where they diagnosed a broken
collar bone, broken/dislocated wrist and broken thumb.

I now have a plate across my collar bone and pins and wires in my wrist
plus a cast on my arm which stays on for eight weeks.

I feel incredibly guilty at not being able to work at the busiest time of the
year and will try to make it up to Jacqueline and Geoff and the rest of the team on my return.

I see many of my clients as friends and have been touched by everyone's genuine show of concern
for my wellbeing. It does make me feel better when Jacqueline comes home with news of best wishes

CASES OF THE MONTH

Spot doing well on Chemo

Spot is a lively 6 year old female Fox Terrier. One day however she was less active and her owners noticed some lumps on her neck.

On examination it was noted that Spot had multiple large swellings over her body. The lumps were not random but were at the sites of her lymph nodes.

A fine needle aspirate was taken from a few of the lymph nodes. A fine needle aspirate is not a biopsy, but rather as the name suggests, an aspiration of cells from the mass. These cells are then put on a slide and sent to the laboratory for staining and examination.

The results came back as Lymphoma, a type of lymphatic cancer. The results were devastating to Spot's owners as she was still very young and had always been so healthy.

Spot's owners were keen to do what they could to help her, so a chemotherapy treatment plan was organised.

The treatments initially involved having intravenous injections weekly for eight weeks plus tablets given by the owners. Spot also had regular blood and urine checks to make sure she was coping with the medicines.

After the initial eight week course Spot went down to every second week for injections and now four months later is only having injections every three weeks.

If Spot is still in remission by six months we will stop all treatment.

Now many people have had experience of Chemotherapy with family members, and the idea of putting their pet through it seems out of the question. However with pets it is different. We aim to put the cancer in remission to buy some good quality of life. Another year, possibly two, for a pet would be seen as a very successful outcome.

Not all cancers respond to chemotherapy but luckily for Spot Lymphoma is the most treatable cancers. The good news is Spot is doing great and her owners are very happy. She has had a few days when she has felt unwell but on the whole has been back to her normal happy self.

Summer Reminders.

1 Flea treatments– Fleas love the warm weather so make sure you treat all of your pets at the recommended interval with a good quality product, to avoid those flea epidemics which are hard to get rid of.

2 Vaccinations– If your pets are going into kennels then make sure their vaccinations are up to date. It is important not to leave this to the last minute.

3 Kennel/Catteries– If you are planning on going away, book a kennel as soon as you can as many people will book a year in advance over Christmas.

4 Keep cool– Don't forget cars get very hot in summer and dogs find it harder to cool down than us. Take some water for the dog when going out for the day this Summer and don't leave the dog in the car.

5 Medicines– When you are getting a repeat of your pets medicine or special food try to get enough to cover the Christmas holiday period as many of the wholesalers are closed during this time.
